Davie County Schools is a place where all children can grow academically, identify and develop their own talents and leadership skills, and find success. With this in mind, we continually search for new ways to make our schools even better places for our children to learn. Davie County Schools had several significant academic accomplishments for 2016-17:

- Davie County Schools met 100% of the participation goals, joining 88.6% of schools across North Carolina that also met all participation goals.
- Both the Grade Level Proficiency (GLP) and College and Career Ready (CCR) proficiency in Davie County Schools increased again slightly in 2016-17, with the GLP increasing from 63.8% to 63.9%, and the CCR increasing from 53.6% to 54.6%. These averages place Davie County Schools in the top 20% of the state.
- Davie County Schools saw 82% of their schools meet or exceed expected growth in 2016-17.
- 68% of high school students in the district achieved the ACT benchmark, earning at minimum the lowest composite score that the UNC College system will accept.
- Over 95% of students met the completion of Math III.
- ACT WorkKeys is the required test for all students graduating high school with a Career and Technical Education concentration. Davie County Schools had the highest percentage of students ever to have earned a Silver certificate or better on the ACT WorkKeys. Almost 90% of these students in Davie County Schools met this significant goal.
- Davie County Schools' four-year graduation rate remained at 87.3%, and the five-year graduation rate increased to 88.3%.

The numbers and letter grades only tell part of the story. We had many successes to celebrate during 2016-2017, with a few highlighted here.

- Davie County High School's Women's Tennis had an undefeated season and were the conference tournament champions.
- Davie County Early College High School was named a Piedmont Triad Education Consortium (PTEC) Signature School.
- William Ellis Middle School's Girls' Soccer Team had an undefeated season.
- South Davie Middle School's Football Team had an undefeated season.
- Davie County High School's Varsity Football Team won the Central Piedmont Conference (CPC) title, in addition to bringing home the titles of Coach of the Year, Punter of the Year, Defensive Player of the Year and Offensive Player of the Year. Chris Reynolds also was selected to play in the Shrine Bowl.
- Davie County High School had the Women's Tennis Player of the Year.
- Dr. Bill Steed, retired DCS superintendent, was inducted into the NCHSAA Hall of Fame.
- Davie County High School's Men's Tennis won the CPC regular season and tournament titles.
- Davie County High School's Men's Swimming was recognized by NCHSAA for outstanding achievement in the classroom and in athletics for the 2016-17 academic year.
- Davie County High School's Women's Varsity Softball was the 2017 CPC tournament champions.
- The William Ellis MathCounts team placed second out of 19 schools in the Northwest North Carolina MathCounts regional competition.
- The William Ellis Math 2 team placed 3rd in the regional Math 2 competition held in Greensboro.
- CTE accomplishments included Business Department: 1st Place in NC for Stock Market Competition; Auto Tech: 2nd Place in State Competition for Automotive; Agriculture Department: 1st Place Extemporaneous Public Speaking Regional Competition; Floriculture Team Competition, 2nd Place Regional Competition; Technical Drafting: 1st Place in Regional Competition for Technical Drafting; 1st Place in State of NC for Technical Drafting and representing NC at the National Skills USA.

DO YOU KNOW?

- Both grade level proficiency and college and career ready percentages in Davie County Schools increased again slightly in 2016-17, with the GLP going from 63.8% to 63.9%, and the CCR going from 53.6% to 54.6%. These averages place Davie County Schools in the top 20% of the state.
- Grade Level Proficiency in math grew from 61.6% to 62% proficient and reading grew from 61.6% to 61.8%. The state of North Carolina also saw increases in both math and reading, with math growing from 54.7% to 55.4% proficient and reading from 56.9% to 57.5% proficient. Positive four year trends in the district for Grade Level Proficiency include the subjects of math in grades 4, 5, 6 and 7 and reading in grades 5 and 6.
- Davie County Schools' four-year graduation rate remained at 87.3%, and the five-year graduation rate increased to 88.3%.
- The ACT, which all juniors take every year, is measured by looking at the percentage of students who achieve a the lowest composite score that the UNC College system will accept. 68% of high school students in the district achieved this benchmark, down from 73.9% the previous year. Across the state, 58.8% of students meet that composite score. In both the district and the state, over 95% of students meet another measure, the completion of Math III.
- ACT WorkKeys, the required test for all students graduating high school with a Career and Technical Education concentration, had their highest percentage of students ever earn a Silver certificate or better. Almost 90% of those students in Davie County Schools met this goal. Across the state, 73.3% of students earned a Silver certificate or above.
- The dropout rate in North Carolina public schools and Davie County Schools decreased in 2015-16 from the previous year. The state dropout rate decreased from 2.39 in 2014-15 to 2.29 in 2015-16, while in Davie County Schools the rate decreased from 3.4 to 3.01.
- Davie County Schools saw 82% of their schools meet or exceed expected growth in 2016-17. This percentage was the same as schools that met or exceeded growth in 2015-16, but the percentage of those that exceeded growth increased from 36% to 46%. In the state, 73.7% of schools met or exceeded growth.
- Participation goals for each district are to include 95% or more of each student group in every achievement measure. Student groups include all racial and gender groups, plus other special student groups such as Exceptional Children and English Learners. Davie County Schools met 100% of these participation goals, joining 88.6% of schools across North Carolina that also met all participation goals.
- Students with at least one qualifying Parent-Teacher conference was 98 percent for the first semester and 92 percent for the second semester.
- There were 440 certified teachers, 75 that were National Board certified, and 146 teacher assistants. Fifty-nine percent of DCS teachers have taught 10+ years. According to the NC Teaching Conditions 2016 report, DCS is a great place to work with 92.6 percent of teachers considering their school overall a "good place to work and learn."
- Davie County Schools have 16 facilities and we maintain over 1.1 Million square feet with 500 acres. The Maintenance Department closed out over 3344 work orders this past year, including the following projects: HVAC replacement - classroom suites

 Cooleemee, North Davie, South Davie; fire alarm system - upgrades – Cornatzer; flooring replacement - classrooms - Shady Grove; flooring replacement - multipurpose room/classrooms - South Davie; parking lot project – Mocksville; HVAC controls upgrade - District automation controls; key card system - South Davie; door replacements - foyer – WRD; gym floor replacement - Shady Grove, Pinebrook; roof replacement - WRD gym/kitchen.
- Construction continues on the one new Davie County High School. Opening is set for fall 2017.

STEM Initiatives

Robotics: On April 7, Davie County Schools held its 7th Annual Robotics Competition at Davie County High School. Five elementary schools and three middle schools all competed in this year's event. The elementary school theme was a throwback to the Wake Forest Baptist Health Challenge. Eighteen teams from five Davie County elementary schools competed in this years event. Thirteen teams from the three Davie County middle schools competed in the second year of capture the golf balls. Teams engineered and built their EV3 robots to collect golf balls and return them to their assigned bin. Teams competed simultaneously on a three-dimensional table, avoiding obstacles and other teams to collect the most balls for the win. This competition incorporated remote control and the sumo wrestling aspect from the previous challenges this year.

STEM Pipeline: Davie County Schools developed a STEM pipeline for rising 7th grade students in order to increase interest and performance in STEM related studies leading into high school Biology. Through a Davie Community Foundation Grant, STEM Pipeline Summer Camp students engaged in problem based learning (PBL), collaborated in order to respond to a complex question, problem, or challenge, practiced 21st Century Skills (such as collaboration, communication & critical thinking) and created high-quality products & digital media presentations. During the first week of camp, students were presented with two different forensic cases. As a culminating activity, students visited Discovery Place in Charlotte. In the second week, students assumed the role of automotive



engineers. They were challenged to design and construct a model car that was powered by an electric motor using direct current from a solar cell. As a culminating activity, students visited the Nascar Hall of Fame and Museum. The camp was attended by 31 students representing all three middle schools.

STEM Center: The STEM Center at Davie County High School is in its 5th year. With 490 STEM students and 22 STEM teachers in 2016-17, the Center continued working toward the vision of developing "a community of adventurous and purposeful thinkers meeting challenges with confidence." In the process, students benefited from having a common instructional framework across core STEM courses. Lunch & Learn sessions were held once a month and included medical professionals, lawyers, dental hygienists, professors and other STEM career professionals. The third annual Davie High STEM Center STEMinar was held on September 28th with professionals in the community and included 230 students attending three sessions of their choice with 17 guest speakers. Enrichment field trips, which included a trip to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for a day, immersed in physics, astronomy, STEM careers and campus experiences occurred in March. The STEM Center continues the tradition of growing partnerships with the community, adding partnerships this year with Catawba College, Five and Two Farms and Vulcan Industries. A total of 99 students graduated from the Stem Center in June 2017.

Community Volunteers

Beginning in 2013-14, Davie County Schools started using the App Garden Volunteer Tracker system. This system helps streamline processing volunteer applications. Once volunteers are approved in the Volunteer Tracker, they only need to update their profile as needed. In addition, volunteers are able to log their time anywhere they have internet access. Perhaps most importantly, we are now able to easily communicate volunteer opportunities with our volunteers. This year, we had **2,000+** volunteers, which averages **over 40,000** hours per year, **101** school partners and **60** district-wide partners.


